

TALENTS DURBAN

WELCOME

The 36th Durban International Film Festival proudly presents the 8th edition of Talents Durban in co-operation with Berlinale Talents. Talents Durban is a five-day development programme for emerging African filmmakers. It is one of six Talents International Programmes affiliated with the Berlinale Talents programme. The initiative hosts 40 selected participants from across Africa through industry-related seminars, workshops, master classes, networking events and hands-on development programmes: Doc Station, Script Station and Talent Press.

This year's theme: Start Motion, draws inspiration from early filmmakers who made use of stopmotion techniques to bring a sequence of still images to life on screen, astonishing audiences with the fantastical new medium. Throughout the history of film, new technologies have continued to revolutionise the way we make and watch films. The 8th instalment of Talents Durban aims to identify the compelling new voices of emerging African filmmakers and invites them to re-invent their approach to making films on the continent.

The Talents Durban programme features three hands-on development programmes: Doc Station, Script Station and Talent Press. **DOC Station** selects three documentary projects in development for coaching and mentoring towards participation in a public pitch at the DFM's pitching forum, The African Pitch. Participants are given mentoring prior to the pitching and during preparations at the festival. Script Station is a script development programme for short films that pairs four writers with script editors who assist in clarifying story and to get to an advanced draft of their script. Talent Press, presented in cooperation with FIPRESCI, invites four critics to cover the films and events of the Durban International Film Festival for online and print publication.

More about the Berlinale Talents Programme

Berlinale Talents is an annual creative summit and networking platform for a selected group of 300 promising film professionals from various disciplines and film critics from all over the world during the Berlin International Film Festival in Germany. Apart from a summit programme of master classes and panel discussions, Berlinale Talents consists of several studio programmes, the Talent Press and a range of Project Labs (Talent Project Market, Doc Station, Script Station and Short Film Station) in which producers and writers/directors can further develop and present their projects. Berlinale Talents is an initiative of the Berlin International Film Festival. The application deadline for 2016 is on the 1st of September 2015. Since 2004, new shoots of Talent initiatives have been sprouting internationally: Guadalajara/Mexico, Buenos Aires/Argentina, Durban/South Africa, Sarajevo/Bosnia and Herzegovina, Beirut/Lebanon and Tokyo/Japan.

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Programme Overview

The 8th Talents Durban programme, held in cooperation with the Berlinale Talents, welcomes you to an intensive five-day programme of workshops and masterclasses with a key focus on networking. Here, our 40 selected participants will be given the opportunity to meet and engage with African and international filmmakers and experts within the industry. The 8th Talents Durban team welcomes you to Durban and hopes that you will make the most of your stay by developing invaluable skills and forging relationships that lead to opportunities for future collaborations.

Workshops and Seminars

The Talents Durban programme features a daily schedule of master classes and workshops, tailormade for all 40 participants. Please ensure that you check your schedule regularly so that you are able to experience Talents Durban to its fullest.

Festival Opening and Screenings

This year, the Talents Durban starts at the opening of the 36th Durban International Film Festival screening of *Ayanda* by Sara Blecher. Talents Durban accredition allows you access to all festival screenings.

DOC Station

Doc station is a hands-on training programme whereby three selected Talents Durban participants who submitted documentary projects are given expert mentorship on their work. The participants then pitch their project at the Durban FilmMart's African Pitching Forum on Sunday, 19 July at the Elangeni Hotel. Talents who wish to attend are welcome!

Talent Press

Talents Durban mentors four emerging African film critics and journalists; Talent is presented in partnership with the Fipresci as they will be covering events and films of the 36th Durban International Film Festival. The FIPRESCI is an organisation of film critics and films journalists, established in different countries for the promotion and development of film culture.

Script Station

Script Station selects four short films currently in development and these stories are given advanced consultation and mentoring by three script editors as well as participation in scriptwriting workshops that provide a collaborative space in which to revise their script.



New Filmmaking Strategies: From South Africa to Pan Africa and Towards a Global Market

ngus Finney is a leading international film and creative industry specialist. Finney has a PhD in Business Strategy (Film Value Chain and Project Management) from Cass Business School, City University, and London. He has an MA in Film and Journalism from New York University, a postgraduate diploma from City University and a BA from Sussex University in International Relations. His work includes MBA-level teaching at The Judge Business School, Cambridge University and Cass Business School, City University, London. He is the manager of Europe's only Production Finance Market, hosted by Film London annually. Angus spent three years working as a risk manager and media advisor for Octopus Media, part of Octopus Investment. He has been appointed Course Director for the Exeter University/London Film School MA in International Film Business. His work has recently included acting as a government expert witness in two high profile cases, including the £1bn tax tribunal involving Ingenious Media and HMRC. 
STEFANO TEALDI

Pitching your Way into the International Film Business

ohannesburg-born Stefano Tealdi studied architecture in Torino (Italy) and graduated at the MEDIA training course 'EAVE - European Session'. After graduating, he worked on film and television at the Politecnico di Torino as Head of Production and directed 17 editions of the annual Italian Workshop Documentary in Europe, chaired EDN (European Documentary Network). He is the national co-ordinator for INPUT, Television in the Public Interest. In 1985 he, along with others, founded Stefilm where he works as a director and producer. Stefilm produces one-off documentaries and documentary series such as: A World of Pasta, Doctor Ice (Science Film Festival – Milano 2009), Coffee Please and Tea for All, as well as the series Food Markets – In the Belly of the City. His recent works includes: Mostar United (IDFA 2009), Vinylmania (IFF Rotterdam 2012), Char, No man's Island (Berlinale Forum 2013), and The Oueen of Silence (IDFA 2014). Stefano Tealdi tutors film development and production at universities and master courses, and film pitching for organisations such as Biennale Cinema College, Cannes Film Market, Films de 3 Continents - Produire au Sud, Media Business School, Med Film Factory, Scuola Holden, TFL-Torino Film Lab, Cinema do Brasil, and ZELIG Film School.

BORIS LOJKINE



Barbon of the prestigious Ecole Normale Supérieure and a philosophy teacher. He wrote a PhD thesis about Crisis and History but decided to leave the academic world and go back to Vietnam to learn the language and look for adventure. While in Vietnam he made two documentary films titled: *Those Who Remain* (2001) and *Wandering Souls* (2005), which recount the impossible mourning of men and women whose lives have been torn apart by war. With *Hope*, his first fiction film, he changes continents and immerses himself in the lives of African migrants.

From Documentary to Fiction Film

"There are many ways to become a filmmaker. Before *Hope*, my first fiction film, I made some documentary films. This is how I learned filmmaking, but also, and more important, how I learned to look at things, people, situations, and even stories. *Hope* is, no doubt, fiction. I wrote a tense, highly dramatic script for the film and subsequently, the entire process of making *Hope* was completely different from everything I did before. But at the same time, I tried in many ways to keep some of my 'documentaristic' approach. I did a lot of field research, I chose to work only with non-professional actors and I directed them in a way that they could bring into the film what they are. I guess that my former experience as a documentary filmmaker gave me a special concern about realism but this is a question for any director: how do you bring reality into the fiction process?" – *Boris Lojkine*

A nthony Silverston is a partner and Head of Development at Triggerfish. He is director and cowriter of *Khumba*, which premiered in competition at Annecy International Animation Festival 2013 and held the number one spot at the South African box office for two weeks. He was also one of the writers and producers of *Zambezia* and completed three independent stop-motion shorts, one of which, The *Slipper Cycle*, won Best Independent Animation at The Independents' Film Festival in Florida. He also holds a Bachelor of Science (Hons).



Andy's documentary track record spans 15 years and includes a major network TV series, one-off feature documentaries and everything in between. A former teacher, including a three-year stint in Zimbabwe, he moved to London in 1996 and was bitten by the digital technology bug. He first set up, then managed the inhouse film unit for international development agency VSO and in 2000 was a co-founder of the screenstation collective, programming films for London's legendary Mwalimu Express. He has produced and directed in over 20 Africans countries and in 2013 set up Radio Film in Newcastle with feature film producer/director Ashley Horner. His latest documentary, *I Shot Bi Kidude*, narrating his role in the dramatic kidnapping of the world's oldest living Taarab singer, played at DIFF as a work in progress.





JIHAN EL-TAHRI is a writer, director and producer. She received her BA and MA in political science from the American University in Cairo. She worked as a news correspondent with US News, World Report and Reuters. In 1990, El-Tahri started directing and producing documentaries for French television and for the BBC. In 1992, she filmed Osama Bin Laden's training camps in Sudan. She also provided professional support for the future films in 2001. The documentary, *The House of Saud*, appeared on the BBC in 2004 and on PBS in 2005.
